London Crossrail - Megaproject as Keyhole Surgery

With blue hoardings and construction diversions marking its route all across the capital from Heathrow to the Thames Gateway, the east-west Crossrail is Europe's largest construction project. Its planning history goes back 150 years to the origins of the Underground.

Michael Hebbert charts the shifts and turns of this long-delayed megaproject, highlighting the Canary Wharf factor, and looks forward to the completion of the Crossrail and the insertion of its stations into the urban fabric of the capital.

^{*} Michael Hebbert is Professor of Town Planning at the Bartlett School of Planning, University College London, and edits the leading international journal of planning history, Planning Perspectives. Born in Glasgow in 1947, his first degree was in Modern History at Merton College Oxford, and he took his doctorate in the Department of Geography at Reading University under the supervision of Professor Peter Hall. He has taught planning history and theory at Oxford Brookes University, the London School of Economics and the University of Manchester, and published widely on many aspects of city planning past and present. Since chairing the Design Review Panel for London Crossrail in 2005-8 he has both followed its progress and started to follow up the history of its long gestation.
